**Re: Public Records Act Request**

Dear Public Information Officer:

Pursuant to the Nevada Public Records Act, N.R.S. Chapter 239, American Oversight makes the following request for records.

On July 29, 2020, the United States Postal Service (USPS) issued a warning to 46 states and the District of Columbia—excluding only states that already conduct universal vote-by-mail elections—that delays in processing postage might result in ballots being uncounted.<sup>1</sup> These letters were reportedly planned even before operational changes made by newly appointed Postmaster General Louis DeJoy, changes which have resulted in significant delays in mail delivery times, even as states prepare to send and receive record numbers of mail ballots.<sup>2</sup>

American Oversight seeks records with the potential to shed light on Nevada's preparedness for the November 2020 election, including communications with USPS in anticipation of widespread use of mail ballots.

**Requested Records**

American Oversight requests that the Office of the Secretary of State produce the following records within five business days:

All email communications (including emails, complete email chains, email attachments, calendar invitations, and attachments thereto) sent by  
(a) Secretary of State Barbara Cegavske, or anyone communicating on her behalf, such as a scheduler or assistant; or Deputy Secretary of State for Elections Wayne Thorley, or anyone communicating on his behalf, such as a

scheduler or assistant, to (b) anyone with an email address ending in @usps.com or @usps.gov.

Please provide all responsive records from June 1, 2020, to the date the search is conducted.

Please note that American Oversight has limited its request to messages **sent** by the specified officials in order to limit the volume of responsive records. American Oversight still requests that complete email chains be produced. So, for example, if a government official sent a response to an incoming message from one of the email domains noted above, the email chain containing the initially received message and the response is responsive to this request.

Please consult with American Oversight on any fees your office expects it may assess.

American Oversight is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit with the mission to promote transparency in government, to educate the public about government activities, and to ensure the accountability of government officials. American Oversight uses the information gathered, and its analysis of it, to educate the public through reports, press releases, or other media. American Oversight also makes materials it gathers available on its public website and promotes their availability on social media platforms, such as Facebook and Twitter.<sup>3</sup>

### **Guidance Regarding the Search & Processing of Requested Records**

In connection with its request for records, American Oversight provides the following guidance regarding the scope of the records sought and the search and processing of records:

- Our request for records includes any attachments to those records or other materials enclosed with those records when they were previously transmitted. To the extent that an email is responsive to our request, our request includes all prior messages sent or received in that email chain, as well as any attachments to the email.
- Please search all relevant records or systems containing records regarding agency business. Do not exclude records regarding agency business contained in files, email accounts, or devices in the personal custody of your officials, such as personal email accounts or text messages.
- In the event some portions of the requested records are properly exempt from disclosure, please disclose any reasonably segregable non-exempt portions of

the requested records. N.R.S. § 239.010(3). If a request is denied in whole, please state specifically why it is not reasonable to segregate portions of the record for release.

- Please take appropriate steps to ensure that records responsive to this request are not deleted by the agency before the completion of processing for this request. If records potentially responsive to this request are likely to be located on systems where they are subject to potential deletion, including on a scheduled basis, please take steps to prevent that deletion, including, as appropriate, by instituting a litigation hold on those records.

### **Conclusion**

If you have any questions regarding how to construe this request for records or believe that further discussions regarding search and processing would facilitate a more efficient production of records of interest to American Oversight, please do not hesitate to contact American Oversight to discuss this request. American Oversight welcomes an opportunity to discuss its request with you before you undertake your search or incur search or duplication costs. By working together at the outset, American Oversight and your agency can decrease the likelihood of costly and time-consuming litigation in the future.

If it will accelerate release of responsive records to American Oversight, please also provide responsive material on a rolling basis.
