**Re: Public Records Request**

Dear Public Records Officer:

Pursuant to Article I, section 24(a), of the Florida Constitution, and Florida's public records laws, as codified at Fla. Stat. Chapter 119, American Oversight makes the following request for records.

**Requested Records**

American Oversight requests that your office promptly produce the following:

All email communications (including email messages, complete email chains, and email attachments) sent by the Florida Secretary of State Officials listed below concerning ballot drop boxes, including but not limited to the October 14, 2020 guidance letter issued by General Counsel Brad McVay to local elections officials regarding ballot drop boxes.

**Secretary of State Officials:**

- a. Secretary of State, Laurel Lee
- b. Division of Elections Director, Maria Matthews
- c. General Counsel, Brad McVay
- d. Deputy General Counsel, Ashley Davis
- e. Assistant General Counsel, Colleen O'Brien

For this request, American Oversight believes that records containing the terms below are likely to be responsive records, and requests that your office, at a minimum, employ the following search terms to identify responsive records:

**Suggested Search Terms:**

1. Deputize
2. Deter
3. "discretionary site"
4. "discretionary sites"
5. Dropoff
6. Drop-off
7. "drop off"
8. Dropbox
9. "drop box"
10. Dropboxes



11. "drop boxes"
12. Spoil

13. Spoiled
14. "video monitor"

In an effort to accommodate the Office of the Secretary of State and reduce the number of potentially responsive records to be processed and produced, American Oversight has limited its request to emails sent by the specified officials. To be clear, however, American Oversight still requests that complete email chains be produced, displaying both sent and received messages. This means, for example, that both Secretary Lee's response to an email regarding ballot drop-off locations and the initial received message are responsive to this request and should be produced.

Please provide all responsive records from October 1, 2020, through the date the search is conducted.

American Oversight insists that your agency use the most up-to-date technologies to search for responsive information and take steps to ensure that the most complete repositories of information are searched. American Oversight is available to work with you to craft appropriate search terms. **However, custodian searches are still required; your office may not have direct access to files stored in .PST files, outside of network drives, in paper format, or in personal email accounts.**

In the event some portions of the requested records are properly exempt from disclosure, please disclose any reasonably segregable non-exempt portions of the requested records. If it is your position that a document contains non-exempt segments, but that those non-exempt segments are so dispersed throughout the document as to make segregation impossible, please state what portion of the document is non-exempt, and how the material is dispersed throughout the document. If a request is denied in whole, please state specifically that it is not reasonable to segregate portions of the record for release.

Please take appropriate steps to ensure that records responsive to this request are not deleted by your office before the completion of processing for this request. If records potentially responsive to this request are likely to be located on systems where they are subject to potential deletion, including on a scheduled basis, please take steps to prevent that deletion, including, as appropriate, by instituting a litigation hold on those records.

To ensure that this request is properly construed, that searches are conducted in an adequate but efficient manner, and that extraneous costs are not incurred, American Oversight welcomes an opportunity to discuss its request with you before you undertake your search or incur search or duplication costs. By working together at the outset, American Oversight and your agency can decrease the likelihood of costly and time-consuming litigation in the future.

Where possible, please provide responsive material in electronic format by email or in PDF or TIF format on a USB drive. Please send any responsive material being sent by mail to American Oversight, 1030 15th Street NW, Suite B255, Washington, DC

20005. If it will accelerate release of responsive records to American Oversight, please also provide responsive material on a rolling basis.

### **Conclusion**
